1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER

Chair Gray called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m.

Chair Gray respectfully acknowledged that the meeting was being held on the traditional territory of Okanagan Nation and welcomed Kathy Holland, attending on behalf of Dir. Lisa Wilson.

5. ADOPTION OF MINUTES

5.1 Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Okanagan Basin Water Board of October 3, 2017 at Regional District of North Okanagan in Coldstream.

A few changes in attendance noted.

"THAT the minutes of the regular meeting of the Okanagan Basin Water Board of October 3, 2017 at Regional District of North Okanagan in Coldstream be approved as amended."

CARRIED

6. CHAIR REPORT

Chair Gray noted that in reviewing the Province's Early Detection and Rapid Response Plan for mussels, that it was vague with response details. It was noted that the report was unveiled in February 2015 and perhaps it's time to review and update it.

7. STAFF REPORTS

7.1 Executive Director Report

Dr. Sears provided an update on the 2018 board meeting schedule. There was some discussion about the rotation of the meetings between RDNO, RDCO and RDOS and the driving distance and carbon footprint for North and South Okanagan directors. Dr. Sears agreed to provide an updated schedule at the next board meeting with five meetings in the Central Okanagan, and two each in the North and South.

"THAT the meeting schedule be updated to include five meetings at Central Okanagan Regional District, two at North Okanagan Regional District and two at Okanagan-Similkameen Regional District."

CARRIED

The board was provided an update on local applications to the Union of BC Municipalities for Floodplain Mapping Grants, including the shortlisting of applications for RDCO and RDOS.

Dr. Sears noted a bathymetry study (looking at the topography of the bottom of a water body) done by the Washington State Dept. of Ecology on at the mouth of Osoyoos Lake and Okanagan River channel, and its use in milfoil control and other water management efforts. She added there is discussion about the Dept. of Ecology conducting a similar study on Osoyoos Lake as a whole.

The OBWB is a partner with UBC Okanagan on a Community Water Forum set for Nov. 14. This is part of the work being done through the Water Research Chair, trying to engage the wider community on water conversations.

The Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association recently received international "Biosphere Certification," a commitment to environmental sustainability with its members. The OBWB was invited to participate and advise on these efforts, offering an opportunity to promote protection of upland watersheds and other sensitive areas. Directors were interested in how this designation and OBWB's input could help mitigate impacts on water.

Dr. Sears updated the board on water conditions in the Okanagan, noting that the valley was still in nominal drought as of the previous week.

"THAT the Executive Director's Report, dated Nov. 1, 2017, be received." CARRIED

7.2 Water Stewardship Director Report

Mr. Jatel reported on the October council meeting and presentations by Michael Rusello on

UBCO water fishery research and Brian Symonds and Shaun Reimer on the 2017 flood year.

The Nov. 9 council meeting will include a presentation from RDNO's Renee Clark on efforts to address backcountry recreation in their watershed, Denise Nielsen with Ag Canada on climate change-related agriculture initiatives in the Okanagan, Okanagan and Collaborative Conservation Program's Scott Boswell on projects including foreshore inventory mapping, and OBWB's James Littley with an update on the Water Board's policy initiatives to address invasive mussels.

The OBWB and Canadian Water Resources Association is co-hosting an Environmental Flow Needs national conference October 17-19, 2018 in Kelowna. Preparation is now underway.

The BC Water Use Reporting Centre allows utilities to report their water use to the province online. An interface was added for ag water users which is being piloted in B.C. for the next three months. The BC Oil and Gas Commission is also considering it for licencees in this sector.

"THAT the Water Stewardship Director's report, dated Nov. 1, 2017, be received." CARRIED

7.3 Operations and Grants Manager Report

Mr. Littley provided an update on milfoil operations, explaining that rototilling has started and Zosel Dam operators are keeping Osoyoos Lake water levels high enough to allow the milfoil crew to continue to work. It was noted that the south end of Kelowna's Rotary Beach has changed from hard-packed sand to silty and muddy conditions, possibly from increased dock building in past years, which could create problems with the shallow water tiller getting stuck.

Work is continuing to find a solution for rototilling on Vaseux Lake.

The board was reminded of its meeting with federal officials in June regarding invasive mussels and that there has still been no formal response. It was suggested that the board follow-up with a letter. Dir. Findlater suggested the letter be cc'ed to Okanagan MLAs and MPs, as well as those who attended the Ottawa meeting, including Terry Beech.

Dir. Pike referenced the Communications Director's report, noting a conference call with the province and B.C. invasive species groups, regarding aquatic invasive outreach efforts, during which it was said that invasive mussels have not been a priority in the Lower Mainland or Northeast B.C. Staff noted efforts to bring this to the attention of the Fraser Basin Council.

"THAT staff prepare a follow-up letter to federal ministers regarding the urgent need for more federal action, and a news release referencing both provincial and federal actions over the last summer."

CARRIED

The board reviewed the latest provincial inspection stats.

Mr. Littley presented the board with the Water Conservation and Quality Improvement 2018-19 Grant Program's call for applications. Applications are due Friday, February 16th at 4 p.m.

There was discussion about annual themes as funding priorities. Dir. Dirk asked that recommendations be provided with supporting documentation.

"THAT for the 2018-19 WCQI grant competition annual theme, the OBWB seeks projects focused on drought and flood preparedness, mapping, water quality and source water protection; THAT applications in these categories are prioritized for funding during staff review with the awarding of up to 10 extra points toward the total score; and THAT the process and scoring criteria for the grant competition be approved as outlined."

CARRIED

"THAT the Operations and Grants Manager's Report, dated Oct. 31, 2017, be received." CARRIED

7.4 Communications Director Report

Ms. Jackson gave an update on the release of "The River Film," adding she is compiling requests from those interested in additional screenings and/or a DVD copy for follow-up.

The board was briefed on the WaterSmart Innovations conference put on by the Southern Nevada Water Authority in October.

Following up on the earlier discussion regarding the Province's Invasive Mussel Outreach and Inspection 2107 Wrap-up with local invasive species groups, Ms. Jackson reported that the province is working with the Habitat Conservation Trust Fund on logistics to award funds to groups to conduct invasive mussel water monitoring. This is part of the \$450,000 over three years, announced by the province in March 2017.

Directors were told about a letter that has now gone out to environmental professional groups (e.g. Engineers and Geoscientists of BC), regarding best practices to prevent the spread of the mussels. An article is also being drafted to appear in their magazines and newsletters.

The board was told that the OBWB and its Okanagan WaterWise program was named a finalist and presented with a plaque at the Kelowna Chamber Business Excellence Awards for the 'Don't Move A Mussel" marketing campaign.

Ms. Jackson noted that the OBWB is a sponsor of the Building Sustainable Communities Conference, Nov. 21-24, 2017. She has been helping with promotion of the conference and staff will also be presenting on a number of water topics.

Staff have also re-applied to the UN Associaton of Canada – Green Corps Program to assist with the hiring of another placement to provide additional communications and outreach support.

"THAT the Communications Director's Report, dated Nov. 1, 2017, be received." CARRIED

7.5 Policy and Planning Specialist Report

Ms. Garcia updated the board on the development of a database of approximately 60 bylaw toolkits and planning guides, including a number developed by the OBWB (e.g. Soil Bylaws Toolkit), which will be available on the CivicInfo BC website. The site will include a searchable database and more guides will be added as they are published. This effort is an attempt to raise awareness of these guides and increase their use.

The board was provided a final update on the province's Drought Response Team for 2017. The OBWB, along Dept. of Fisheries and Oceans Canada, First Nations and others, were included on weekly calls with B.C. Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations & Rural Development (FLNRORD) to review current water conditions, The last call for 2017, in October,

allowed for a review of the past season and potential communication improvements for 2018, between the province, local utilities, ag users, and the public.

Ms. Garcia attended the Water Supply Association of BC (WSABC)'s Annual Conference and presented on current OBWB drought preparedness and response initiatives.

Also, a workshop was held Nov. 6 with water suppliers to discuss proposed Mainstem Drought Triggers Guidelines. About 20 large water suppliers attended, The general consensus was that the guidelines have improved. The next step is to look at ways to support water suppliers in putting triggers into their drought plans. The guidelines are intended to help these suppliers determine when lake levels reach a certain level what water restrictions are needed.

8. NEW AND UNFINISHED BUSINESS

8.1 Proposed OBWB budget for 2018-19 - Budget Features Memo

Dr. Sears presented the draft 2018-19 budget with an overall requisition at \$3,450,733 million, a small decrease from the previous year. There has not been a requisition increase since fiscal year 2011/12.

A four-year review of the Water Management Program will be undertaken in 2018 with a reauthorization request to the three Okanagan regional districts, she added.

There was some question as to whether a reduction in requisition was prudent due to potential increase in service costs (e.g. with climate change and invasive mussels). Dr. Sears noted that there needs to be a compelling reason to build the reserves. It is possible that recommendations in the updated Sustainable Water Strategy will require increased funding, but not at this time.

Final 2018 Board Schedule

I've provided the final version of next year's schedule as an attachment to this report, and James has sent out Outlook meeting invitations. The only further adjustments may be to the timing and length of the meetings, for example, with the joint OBWB/Water Stewardship Council meeting in May, and the AGM in August. Thanks for helping fit our unusual year into a workable schedule.

UBCM Floodplain Mapping

I've been continuing to meet with RDCO, RDNO and City of Kelowna staff about the UBCM floodplain mapping grants, and making preparations. The funding decisions are to be made in January, and we anticipate success. The LiDAR remote-sensing flight, to measure topography, should ideally be flown in early March, so there will be very little turn-around time between funding confirmation, releasing an RFP, and getting a flight scheduled. Everyone is firmly committed to working together, and it is shaping up to be a model of collaboration. We won't get notification about the RDOS funding until later in the spring, but that process is also going to be collaborative. By year's end we hope to have most of the valley mapped.

BC Water Funders Water Monitoring Scan

For the last several months, OBWB has been leading a partnership project with the BC Water Funders, to understand the state of water quality and water supply monitoring in B.C. That is, we wish to understand who is doing the monitoring, where it is happening, what they are monitoring for, and the quality and accessibility of the data. To date, we have received \$37,500 through funding agreements with the Real Estate Foundation of BC, the Pacific Salmon Foundation, the Columbia Basin Trust, and the Ministry of Environment. The funds go toward the costs of a consultant, a series of webinars, and a workshop. The workshop is scheduled for early December, and will include leaders in the field in B.C. The final consultant's report will be completed in January.

The OBWB has been working on bringing together water supply monitoring information for many years, between the surface flow gauges, the groundwater observation well networks, the BC Water Use Reporting Centre, and estimating irrigation needs with the Water Demand Model. Water quality monitoring in the valley is much less organized. I've been collecting all the available links to data and technical reports on our water quality webpage: http://www.obwb.ca/water-quality-monitoring/


Okanagan Falls Wetland Project

The Okanagan Falls treatment wetland project is moving forward in 2018. This is an ambitious project to construct a wetland next to the treatment plant to receive and further polish the tertiary treated effluent before it is finally discharged to the river. This step reduces the level of endocrine disruption compounds in the river channel, an important salmon-spawning area. It also reduces the risk of accidental nutrient releases downstream.

The wetland was part of the original design of the plant, but ran into a number of obstacles – including the Canadian Wildlife Service rescinding their approval to build the wetland on federal lands, and the need for RDOS to purchase property on the east side of the river. As sewage treatment infrastructure, the wetland construction is eligible for OBWB funding (16% of costs associated with pre-1978 development). UBC-Okanagan and Ducks Unlimited Canada have also expressed interest in the project, and we hope to assist RDOS with finding external funds for developing boardwalks, signage and public access as an open classroom.


Weather Report

The Mission Creek and Brenda Mines snow pillows are exactly tracking the historical averages for snow-water accumulation for this time of year. As there isn't much to see, I'm only including a chart for Mission Creek (our biggest water source).




NOAA predicts moderate below normal temperatures through February 2018 (Map 1, below), this is consistent with the ECCC prediction last month, and is the most recent seasonal prediction available. They also forecast above normal precipitation (Map 2, below). How this plays out will be determined by the developing La Niña conditions in the Pacific Ocean. Weak La Niña conditions are predicted to continue (~65%-75% chance) at least through the Northern Hemisphere winter 2017-18, with a 51% chance of continuation through February-April 2018. During La Niña, B.C. is typically colder and wetter than normal.

Project updates:

Okanagan Wetland Strategy: November 20 workshop



In support of the multi-phase Okanagan wetland strategy, an Okanagan wetland workshop was hosted by the BC Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) on November 20th in West Kelowna. Wetlands are the key feature of green or natural infrastructure within any community. Nested in a regional context that provides stronger justification for local government decisions about individual private properties, the conservation and restoration of wetlands helps address flooding, drought, biodiversity and ecological health challenges.

This workshop brought together government and provincial staff along with local and regional experts and conservation partners to achieve the following: 1) provide an update on recent wetland conservation initiatives and activities in the Okanagan, 2) increase awareness of the role of the WSA in wetland protection, 3) identify best practices for local government tools for wetland conservation, and 4) identify strategies and opportunities to improve wetland conservation outcomes in the Okanagan.



The conference was hosted by the

Ecosystems Section of the Ministry of FLNRORD in partnership with the Okanagan Basin Water Board and Ducks Unlimited Canada and with the support of the South Okanagan Similkameen Conservation Program, the Okanagan Collaborative Conservation Program, the BC Wildlife Federation, and the Planning Institute of BC.

Okanagan Constructed Wetlands Guidebook

We have begun preparing a guidebook for local governments to use in the design and implementation of engineered wetlands for stormwater retention and treatment in the Okanagan ("the guidebook").

The vision underlying this guidebook on constructed wetlands is to build a framework from relevant sections of existing municipal stormwater wetland plan(s) and include critical Okanagan information specific to stormwater wetland function.



We will use readily available

information and avoid duplication of effort, and will clearly define the guidebook content and information needs and potential gaps upfront.

OBWB has identified that source water protection is a growing area of concern, as well as the expanding urban development pressure on water infrastructure that leads to an increase of volumes of stormwater runoff, which increase water quality concerns. Using constructed wetlands in stormwater management planning can reduce water quality concerns and increase the protection of Okanagan water sources. OBWB's Okanagan Wetland Strategy Project (currently in Phase III) has identified the need to organize and provide resources for wetland-related activities, including the need for further wetland inventory, prioritization of high value conservation wetlands, reduction of urban development pressure on wetlands, and reduction of impacts of stormwater discharge into natural, native wetlands. Recommendations also include the development of comprehensive and reliable wetland information to support effective planning, law-making, and policy development (Okanagan Wetland Strategy Project Phase I, Patterson et. Al. 2014).

This guidebook will satisfy these recommendations by producing clear location-specific guidelines for implementing constructed wetlands in the Okanagan.

Key concepts to consider when constructing a wetland for stormwater management in the unique Okanagan Basin include:

- Hydrologic regime of the Okanagan Basin, the driest region in B.C.;
- Water supply and demand of the urban and agricultural setting (i.e. extensive vineyards in South Okanagan);
- Climate change predictions on precipitation patterns in the basin (i.e. warmer wetter winters, hotter drier summers); and
- Flooding of natural river systems in urbanized floodplains (i.e. channelized sections of Okanagan River, Mill Creek and Mission Creek).



Council Meeting Highlights*

- Presentation by **James Littley, OBWB** about invasive mussel prevention in the Okanagan. He pointed out huge infrastructure costs are realized in regions where mussels are spread (e.g. USD 2.5M. for two years of inspection and decontamination in Montana). Although tightening inspection rules can result in prolonged periods of decontamination and quarantine for travelers with boats, the potential risk is a significant threat to Okanagan waters.
- Denise Nielsen, AAFC, presented "Climate Change Implications for Crop Sustainability".
 Changes in land use might follow climatic changes as agricultural sector becomes aware of industry-related risks and opportunities and adapts to changes in winter temperatures, soil moisture etc.
- Renee Clark, RDNO, presented the project implemented by district 'Grizzly Recreation &
 Trails BC site' an example of establishing the recreation facility on Crown land to enable
 better control and enforcement in a community watershed.
- Scott Boswell, OCCP 'Realizing a vision for conservation through collaboration Biodiversity conservation strategy for Okanagan region'. Several initiatives funded by local
 and regional governments include establishing the ecological corridors across the region,
 and outreach and communication aimed at increasing the awareness among landowners
 about lakeshore management best practices.
- Irrigation Industry Assoc. of B.C. Blue Ecology Workshop in Richmond on Nov 28 Three levels of certified irrigation technician courses will take place.
- FLNRO working with local governments to document the flood recovery works.
- BC Water Use Reporting Tool testing in progress to link licenses to geographic locations
- Constructed Wetlands Guidebook project local governments encouraged to respond to mail survey.
- Council meeting scheduled for January 11th, 2018. There are a few changes in next year's Board and Council meeting schedule due to the upcoming early (October) local government election. Joint WSC and Board meeting will take place in May, 2018 and the Annual Meeting will be held in August 2018.

Milfoil Control Program Update

2018 is the final year of our 5-year environmental permit for the milfoil treatment program. Over the next several months, I will be working with our GIS contractors to submit a new application for permits. Our intent is to apply for a more general permit, which is based on the activities we conduct, rather than on limited specific treatment areas. This approach should increase our flexibility to respond to new requests for milfoil control, and save time for both OBWB and provincial staff as well as frustration for the public.

Invasive Mussel Update

At the November board meeting, staff was directed to prepare a follow-up letter for federal ministers regarding the urgent need for more federal action, and a news release referencing both provincial and federal actions over the last summer. Following the meeting, Dr. Sears and I were invited to join a conference call with MP Mel Arnold to discuss a response letter he had received from the Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, and from the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans (both in correspondence). We have drafted a new letter to the federal ministers which will be forwarded to the board for consideration before the upcoming meeting.

Sewerage Facilities Assistance Grants

With recent changes to the SFA grant program, we have sent the new Terms of Reference to all eligible local governments to remind them that the program is available. The SFA program is intended to move communities from septic systems to tertiary community sewer in order to improve water quality throughout the basin, and to construct advance sewage treatment plants. The program has been running since 1977, and has aided in significantly reducing the amount of nutrient loading in basin lakes.

To summarize:

- The grant program funds upgrades to treatment plants using old technology and extensions of sewer service to subdivisions, created prior to 1978 that are still on septic.
- Funding will be 16% of total eligible project costs.
- As per OBWB's Supplementary Letters Patents (circa 1976), the Water Board can levy up to 21 cents per \$1,000 assessed value for SFA grants on all properties within the Okanagan drainage area (2018-19 levy is at 1.9 cents/\$1,000 assessed value).

- The OBWB will only fund sewage infrastructure applications in communities that comply with its 1 Hectare Policy, where the community has zoning policies or bylaws prohibiting the creation of lots smaller than 1 ha that are not serviced by community sewers
- Grants are paid on a 20 or 25 year basis, and include an interest payment, based on the current interest amount set by the Municipal Finance Authority when the grant is first funded.

<u>Destination BC - Okanagan Destination Development Strategy</u>

The OBWB was invited to participate in Destination BC's working group planning session on Nov. 28 to help develop a 10-year "Okanagan Valley Destination Development Strategy." This is a follow-up to a meeting I attended back in September at which time issues raised included lake access, water-based and back country recreation, trail development, water management, and management of natural disasters like flood and fire.

Those attending this follow-up meeting included Tourism Kelowna, Travel Penticton, various tourism operators (e.g. hotels, transportation companies, back country tours), Recreation Sites and Trails BC, Sncewips Heritage Museum, the South Okanagan-Similkameen National Park Network, the Okanagan Collaborative Counservation Program, and others. As Dr. Sears noted at the previous board meeting, the OBWB provided support to the Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association in its effort to gain international "Biosphere Destination" certification, which is a commitment to sustainability. Organizers were looking to ensure sustainability was built into this 10-year-plan, including water sustainability. I ensured a voice for water, providing input on the fragility of the Okanagan's ecosystems (including in the back country with our watersheds, and valley bottom lakes and riparian areas), and potential impacts of tourism to these areas, the implications of lake access, and the importance of marketing the region as unique and special, and in need of protection.

Other Communication Initiatives:

Our application to the <u>UN Associaton of Canada – Green Corps Program</u> was accepted, helping with the cost of an Okanagan WaterWise Communications and Outreach contract position (February to September 2018). We have now posted our position and are beginning to receive and review resumes.

As part of the <u>Water Stewardship Council's Communications Committee</u> I have been assisting with a council member survey to follow-up with those who have lower attendance, as well as projects to improve communications with presenters and help archive presentations.

The OBWB is co-hosting an <u>Environmental Flow Needs Conference</u> with the Canadian Water Resources Association, Oct. 17-19, 2018 in Kelowna. As the Communications Chair I am starting to build out a website for the conference and will be providing additional communications support.

The Water Board was a sponsor of last week's <u>Building Sustainable Communities Conference</u>, Nov. 21-24, in Kelowna. I provided some promotional support. Staff also presented on various water issues (see "Recent Presentations" below), including a session on "Fighting Invasive Species with the 'Don't Move a Mussel' Campaign." We also had a table at the conference which provided an opportunity to talk with local government, non-profit, business and other attendees about the work of the OBWB and outreach efforts through Okanagan WaterWise.

We were also a co-host with UBC Okanagan on a <u>Community Water Forum</u> on Nov. 14 and provided promotional support.

A news release was issued regarding the <u>Water Conservation Quality Improvement Grant Program</u> and call for applications.

Thank you for your letter of August 8, 2017, regarding ongoing collaboration between the Okanagan Basin Water Board (OBWB) and the provincial government on regional water issues. I apologize for the lengthy delay in responding.

It was a pleasure to meet several OBWB staff and board members at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities convention in September. The OBWB provides a unique and valuable opportunity for the provincial government to work with local governments and I look forward to maintaining and enhancing this relationship.

The provincial government shares your concern about zebra and quagga mussels, including the potential degradation of native ecosystems, damage to infrastructure, and hazards to human health and safety. The province appreciates the support of the OBWB and will continue to work with its international, federal, provincial and regional partners to ensure the threat of invasive mussels is addressed effectively. Program enhancements in 2017 included the addition of two new watercraft inspection stations along the United States border, additional signage as well as expanded lake monitoring and early detection efforts. Overall inspection season operations have been extended to mid-November, and the expanded program includes an increase from 32 to 68 inspectors. We will be evaluating the results of this season's program to ensure provincial resources and the efforts of our partners are maximizing effectiveness.

With respect to emergency planning and preparedness, OBWB has been an excellent partner in both drought and flood planning and response, a leader in promoting water conservation and valued communication resource for local governments. The provincial government will continue to support the OBWB by providing comprehensive and timely information, when needed, on flood and drought in the Okanagan Basin. The province has made improvements in drought response and flood safety, but we acknowledge that there is more we can do. Staff are currently developing a Provincial Drought Management Strategy and Provincial Flood Risk Strategy and look forward to OBWB's continued input as we develop these and other new resources.

Regarding the *Water Sustainability Act* (WSA), the province appreciates the positive working relationship with the OBWB and the valuable advice you provided during the development of the legislation and regulations. The

The WSA includes a number of new water governance-related provisions including the ability to create advisory boards, establish water objectives, prepare water sustainability plans and area-based regulations. We look forward to continuing to work with the OBWB as we develop and implement these and other regulatory tools that increase our ability to better address water security.

Staff in my ministry and the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development would be happy to meet with the Okanagan Basin Water Board at any time to review these and other provincial programs and explore opportunities for further progress.

Thank you for your correspondence of September 6, 2017, regarding aquatic invasive species in British Columbia's Okanagan and Shuswap watersheds.


Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) takes seriously the threat posed by aquatic invasive species, and is committed to preventing the entry, spread, and establishment of aquatic invasive species in Canadian waters. To address this issue, DFO worked closely with provinces and territories to develop the federal *Aquatic Invasive Species Regulations*, which as you know came into effect on May 29, 2015.

The Regulations provide provinces and federal government departments, including the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), with tools for the prevention and control of aquatic invasive species. The Regulations prohibit the importation of dead or live zebra and quagga mussels into Canada, as well as the transportation, possession, or release of dead or live zebra and quagga mussels into British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. These prohibitions aim to prevent the spread of these species further west in the country.

With respect to border crossings, the CBSA enforces the import prohibitions listed under the Regulations. This prohibition, along with the *Customs Act*, allows CBSA officers to refuse entry, detain, or refer to DFO or provincial enforcement authorities, any boat or trailer suspected of carrying aquatic invasive species.

DFO collaborates with the CBSA and the provinces through the Canadian Council of Fisheries and Aquaculture Ministers' National Aquatic Invasive Species Committee to ensure that CBSA officers have the information they need to enforce the import prohibitions of the *Aquatic Invasive Species Regulations*.

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As you are aware, Budget 2017 provided \$43.8 million over five years to continue and expand programming for aquatic invasive species, and the Government of Canada is working to identify key actions, such as preventative actions at the border, to minimize the arrival of high-risk species in vulnerable areas. These new funds will allow DFO to continue its collaborative efforts with the CBSA and the provinces.

In British Columbia, there will be new DFO resources to develop, coordinate, and implement regional aquatic invasive species activities. DFO will engage with its federal and provincial partners (including the CBSA) regarding the development of its Aquatic Invasive Species program—this engagement will begin within the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Thank you for writing. I trust that my response has addressed your concerns.

Thank you for your co-addressed correspondence of September 6, 2017, concerning invasive zebra and quagga mussels.

The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) continues to work with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO), Environment and Climate Change Canada, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency, and the provinces and territories to prevent the importation of invasive alien species and plant and animal diseases into Canada.

The CBSA's role under the DFO's Aquatic Invasive Species Regulations is to enforce the import prohibitions listed in Column 4 of Part 2 of the Schedule of the Regulations, which include zebra and quagga mussels.

The Agency is also working with various western provincial authorities to address the movement into British Columbia (BC) of zebra and quagga mussels. Part of this collaboration has included aquatic invasive species sessions held by the BC Ministry of Environment for CBSA officers.

The CBSA is co-operating with BC Ministry of Environment conservation officers and has allowed temporary inspection and education stations to be set up near land border ports of entry in the Okanagan and Kootenay District. Whenever practicable, the CBSA will continue to provide support to the BC Ministry of Environment in allowing these stations to be set up on request.



Under this program, the CBSA is provided with seals to affix on watercraft slated for inspection inland. The Agency retains all of a watercraft's data, licence plate number, etc., and shares it with the inspection site. It is mandatory for all watercraft to stop at roadside inspection stations.

The BC Ministry of Environment is responsible for any enforcement activity resulting from non-compliance.

I appreciate your interest in this important issue.
