



Easy watering tips from Okanagan WaterWise:

the day prevents evaporation.

the sprinkler head, preventing effective water use.

It should sprinkle your lawn and garden, not pavement.

Put water only where it's needed. Don't let water waste time, effort, and money!

Water between dusk and dawn. Putting water to work during the coolest part of

Let your grass grow. Leave grass 2-3 inches tall (5-8 cm). This slows evaporation from the soil, making it work more effectively.

Choose plants suitable to our dry climate. Drought-tolerant turf and native lowwater variety plants save you water, time, and money. Visit the Okanagan Xeriscape Association's Plant Database for a list of WaterWise plants for the

Okanagan. One inch of water a week will do. Most lawns need just 1 inch (2.5 cm) of water

per week – about the depth of a tuna can. Watering deeply and less often promotes deep, healthy root growth.

Check sprinkler heads. Sometimes sprinkler heads break, or plants grow around
